Legislative Make-Up 2011


- □ SENATE: 25 Dems, 15 Reps
- □ ASSEMBLY: 51 Dems, 29 Reps
- 28 New legislators elected in 2010
- □ 28 seats will be "open" in 2012





2011 Legislation

- □ Over 2300 measures introduced in 2011
- □ COA is actively tracking 50 + bills



Areas of COA Interest:

Scope of Practice

- □ Physical Therapy
 - AB 783 (Hayashi)
 - SB 924 (Walters)
- Radiologists Assistants
 - AB 352 (Eng)

Legislation

- □ AB 783 (Hayashi) COA Sponsored
 - Response to recent legislative counsel opinion and actions of PT Board
 - Clarifies that medical corporations may employ PTs
 - Supported by CMA, Podiatric Association, Occupational
 Therapist Association, Chiropractic Association, many PTs
 - Opposed by California Therapy Association

Legislation

- SB 924 (Walters) Sponsored by California
 Physical Therapy Association
 - Reintroduced legislation that has failed twice in the last4 years
 - Would allow direct access for 30 days of patients to physical therapists, without a "diagnosis" by a physician
 - Passed out of Senate Business and Professions
 Committee, but became a 2-year bill
 - Part of nationwide push by PTs to become primary care "doctors"

Radiologist Assistants

- AB 352 creates new license for higher trainedRAs
- Bill as introduced would only allow supervision by radiologist; amended to allow other qualified
 M.D.s to supervise
- Creates Radiologist Assistant Advisory Council under Medical Board to make recommendations to board on standards

Workers Compensation

□ SB 127 (Emmerson)

 COA Sponsored; would require Division of Workers Compensation to update CPT codes annually, per AMA

□ AB 584 (Fong)

COA Sponsored; would require that UR can only be performed by a physician licensed in California; vetoed twice before, has a good chance this year

□ SB 923 (De Leon)

Sponsored by U.S Health Works; would require AD to adopt OFMS based on RBRVS by July 1, 2012; conversion factors in bill as introduced deleted, due to labor opposition

Workers Compensation

- □ AB 1155 (Alejo) Apportionment
 - Would prohibit race, religious creed, color, natural origin, age, gender, marital status, sex, sexual orientation or genetic characteristics from being considered a cause or factor or disability in apportionment or determination
- AB 378 (Solorio) Drug Compounding
 - Would cap payment for compounded drug products
 - Would cap payment for physician-dispensed products

Other Legislation

□ SB 380 (Wright) Mandatory CME, Nutrition

Would have required 7 hours of continuing medical education in nutrition. Bill amended to authorize Medical Board to set content standards for education regarding a chronic disease to include information on nutrition.

□ SB 747 (Kehoe) Mandatory CME, LGBT

Would require providers to complete one course on cultural competency, sensitivity, and best practice for care of lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgendered persons

□ SB 628 (Yee) Traumatology

- Would create certification process for traumatologists
- Scope and training to be determined by committee that includes COA, CMA, and MBC representation

State Budget

- \$26 billion shortfall
- □ Governor proposed \$12 million in cuts and taking money now dedicated to redevelopment, early childhood development, mental health and transit
- Major cuts to health and welfare: 10% medical provider cut, mandatory co-pays for office and hospital visits
- Governor proposed \$14 million in revenue by extending sales,
 income and vehicle taxes
- Too late for June ballot
