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Legislative Win for COA

COA-Sponsored Legislation Passes – Governor Signs Into Law AB 356 (Chen) – Fluoroscopy – Temporary Permit

No longer will surgeons moving to California be delayed in getting into practice as they apply and wait to take the California state-mandated fluoroscopy certification test. Getting scheduled for this test can take 6 months since it is a very manual process, during which time, the surgeon is prevented from using fluoroscopy in their surgeries.

AB 356 sponsored by the California Orthopaedic Association and the California Podiatric Medical Association authorizes a licensed physician and surgeon or doctor of podiatric medicine who has used fluoroscopy in another state to receive a one-time 12-month temporary permit authorizing them to operate or supervise the operation of fluoroscopic x-ray equipment while they wait to take the fluoroscopy certification test. The California Radiological Society also supported the bill.

COA had sought a solution to this issue for the last several years as we had continually received complaints from orthopaedic groups who were adding new surgeons to their group. This bill helps all orthopaedic surgeons coming to California regardless of their practice setting. The bill struck the right balance. Allowing surgeons to utilize fluoroscopy, but still maintaining radiation safety for patients.

As of January 1, 2022 two things will change in prescribing medications:

- 1. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid (CMS) is requiring that Part D prescriptions for Medicare patients for controlled substances must be submitted electronically.
- 2. California is mandating that all prescriptions be submitted electronically.

From March 19: With the Democrats controlling both houses of Congress, there is a likelihood that President Joe Biden's tax proposals may pass this year. 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DWC Legal Counsel Answers 4 Key Questions Asked at COA's 2021 QME Course — Clarifies Other Issues

From July 2:

Question 1

Discussion at the meeting:

Labor Code 4062.3 requires parties to confer prior to sending records to QME/AME and to send the records 10 days in advance of evaluation. If the QME/AME does not get the records 10 days prior to the evaluation, they can communicate to the parties that the records were received, but not reviewed pursuant to California Code of Regulations 9793 (n) because they were not received 10 days prior to the evaluation. Parties will have to send a request for a supplemental report asking the QME/AME to review records.

Suggested sentence to put in Medical-Legal Report – Records were received but not reviewed per CA Code of Reg 9793 (n). If you want me to review the records, please send a request for a supplemental report. (If Declaration not received with records, add – Please also send the required Declaration which includes the number of pages of records sent.)

Response from DWC Legal Counsel:

In review of Labor Code § 4062.3 and regulation § 9793(n), we cannot find where it requires records be delivered to the QME 10 days in advance of the evaluation. However, there is a reference in regulation § 35(i) which indicates that the physician's course of action if the records have not been received 10 days after the date of the evaluation.

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Kaiser Laying Off Hundreds of Healthcare Workers Across Northern CA

From June 4: Kaiser Permanente is laying off hundreds of healthcare workers across Northern California. The layoffs will affects more than 200 healthcare workers at facilities all over Northern California, Union Press Secretary Renée Saldaña confirmed with KRON4. The workers impacted include admitting staff who are often the first line of interaction with patients, patient transport staff who help get patients to the right place for care in Walnut Creek and Antioch, and patient care technicians who provide bedside care in Oakland, among others.

DWC Updates the OMFS for Physician and Non-Physician Services (treatment fee schedule) Effective March 1, 2021

From Feb. 19: The Division of Workers' Compensation (DWC) has updated the Official Medical Fee Schedule (OMFS) for Physician and Non-Physician Services to include the 2021 CMS Medicare updates.

Unlike CMS, the DWC does not calculate the reimbursement amount for each CPT code based on your geographic location. COA provides this service.

AAOS Board of Directors Approves Update to Clinical Practice Guideline

From Sept. 9: The AAOS Board of Directors approved the full update to the 2013 Clinical Practice Guideline (CPG) for Treatment of Osteoarthritis of the Knee. The 2021 Clinical Practice Guideline on Treatment of Osteoarthritis of the Knee (Non-arthroplasty) Third Edition includes updates to all 19 evidence-based recommendations included in the second edition of the guideline, with a total of 29 nonsurgical treatment recommendations.

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DWC Releases Updates to the Medical-Legal Fee Schedule — Effective April 1, 2021

From March 5:

Highlights of the new Fee Schedule:

- Flat rate system starting at \$2,015 which includes 200 pages of records. \$3.00 per page of records thereafter. A projected 25% increase over existing reimbursement levels.
- Supplemental Medical-Legal Evaluation \$650 includes review of 50 pages of records.
- Reimbursement for Missed Appointments \$503.75.
- Depositions \$455 per hour 2 hour minimum.
